

Direct and Indirect Measures

Assessment measures are usually grouped into two dichotomous categories: direct and indirect. Direct assessment measures usually entail an assessment of student products and behaviors. This assessment is often done with the use of some type of rubric. Indirect assessment measures consist of perceptions regarding program quality, student preparation, etc. Indirect measures usually do not include independent assessments of student work. The following chart presents examples of both direct and indirect assessment measures. This is not a comprehensive list but is illustrative of some examples of both categories of assessment measures.
